

## Implementing the UNGPs in the commodities trading sector

Parallel session

27 November

13:30-14:45

Organized by the Swiss Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

**Brief description:** This session organized by the Swiss Ministry of Foreign Affairs will focus on discussing the sector guidance for the commodities trading sector on implementation of the UNGPs, elaborated by a multi-stakeholder group created by the Swiss Government and composed of representatives of the commodities trading sector, civil society and government.

**Background:** Switzerland is one of the world's most important commodity trading hubs. The commodities trading sector is characterized by a diverse mix of companies in terms of size, ownership, turnover and commodities traded. As the commodities trading industry grows in size, questions are increasingly being raised relating to the responsibilities of trading companies on human rights, and other issues such as corruption and the 'resource curse'.

In order to address these challenges, the Swiss Government has facilitated the creation of a multistakeholder group composed of representatives of the commodities trading sector, civil society and government. This group is supporting the elaboration of sector guidance for the commodities trading sector on implementation of the UNGPs. The Institute for Human Rights and Business (IHRB) is facilitating this process.

**Session objectives:** The session will discuss the process and the challenges of elaborating this sector guidance for the commodities trading sector on implementation of the UNGPs, its structure and seek comments and feedback from civil society, business and government representatives. This panel provides concrete examples of industry specific approaches to human rights due diligence, including efforts to improve company and multistakeholder mechanisms to prevent and mitigate adverse impacts involving commodities trading firms.

### **Key discussion questions:**

- What are the challenges and the opportunities of creating guidance for the commodity trading sector within a multistakeholder group?
- What are the peculiarities of commodities trading that make a sector-specific approach helpful for undertaking human rights due diligence processes consistent with the UNGP?
- What are the peculiarities of commodities trading that make a specific approach necessary for undertaking human rights due diligence processes consistent with the UNGP?
- In what ways does the diversity of the commodities trading sector create challenges in implementing the UNGPs?
- How should the Swiss government and other stakeholders support and ensure companies implement the guidance once it is published in early 2018, given its legally non-binding nature?
