Enhance the geographical balance and participation of key stakeholders from all regions including increasing the participation of affected individuals and communities.

This can be achieved by generating funds to support participation of indigenous peoples to be managed by existing mechanisms, such as the OHCHR Voluntary Fund for Indigenous People. A minimum of 20 representatives including women and geographically balanced, shall be ensured.
